STAT OF THE WEEK — SERIAL PRESCRIPTIONS

We currently have 32,579 patients in Ayrshire & Arran on serial prescriptions. This represents 17.9% of all patients on regular repeat medication.

This service is key to allowing all of the pharmacy teams both in community pharmacy and in general practice to deliver clinical services due to the safety and efficiency of this prescribing mechanism. Over the coming months we will be actively increasing the number of patients on serial prescriptions and will be working with colleagues in all of our pharmacy services to support this for the benefit of all involved — especially patients!

NHS Pharmacy First Scotland PGD's

The PGD's for Aciclovir and Flucloxacillin have been granted an extension from the NHS Ayrshire and Arran PGD group to permit the continued use of these for the skin infection and shingles services that form a part of NHS Pharmacy First Scotland.

The extended PGD's will be uploaded to the website in due course but please be assured that these PGD's remain valid and will be replaced with the new versions as soon as they are released from Scottish Government.

The extension has been granted until 3rd November 2023

Midazolam 10mg/ml oromucosal liquid (Epistatus)

The above liquid is available as a 5ml bottle with 4 syringes, and is also available as prefilled syringes which contain 2.5mg in 0.25ml, 5mg in 0.5ml, 7.5mg in 0.75ml and 10mg/ml.

Please be aware that there are 4 DIFFERENT sizes / strengths available!

Of these only the 10mg/1ml prefilled syringe is licensed, and thus appears in the EMC and BNF-C. The prefilled syringes are not graduated, so can only be used to administer the full volume they contain.

Please be aware that pre-filled syringes cannot be used to give part doses, there are no integrations on the syringe.

The paediatric epilepsy service are having reports of parents being given prefilled syringes from which they have to decant the prescribed dose. This is not appropriate. If a prefilled syringe of the correct dose is not available then the 5ml bottle should be prescribed.
