


Antimicrobial Stewardship in Ayrshire and Arran

A powerful presentation which gave insight the work of the Antimicrobial Management Group (AMG) which is a subgroup of the Area Drug & Therapeutics Committee. The AMG's remit is to provide strategic advice on the prescribing and use of antimicrobials and monitor surveillance data on antimicrobial use, resistance and healthcare associated infection within A&A to inform policy and drive improvement in the effective treatment of infection.

The presentation described the new national prescribing indicators for 2024 -2029 which have been reset:

- Reduce total antibiotic use by 5% from the 2019 baseline
- Achieve 70% of total use of antibiotics from the access category
- Increase UK public and healthcare professional's knowledge on AMR by 10%.

The above video was shared on the night which shows the global impact of antibiotic treatment, the threat of resistance and what it could mean for the population of A&A.

Prescribers were encouraged to consider how they could help drive compliance against the targets. For example, minimising antibiotic use, using the A&A empirical guidelines to guide antimicrobial choice, reducing course length to 5 days where clinically appropriate to do so or challenging inappropriate antimicrobial prescribing behaviours.

Sexual Health Update

The last presentation of the evening discussed the increasing rates of teenage pregnancy, termination of pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections in Scotland and in A&A breaking down per locality and comparing men and women infection rates. Activity data was shared from services available in A&A aimed at preventing these increasing trends.

Refreshed training on CCard and STI Kits is now available for the whole pharmacy team and it is hoped that all contractors will sign up and actively create opportunities to promote the services available.

Upcoming Prescribing Improvement work – DPP-4 Inhibitors

As part of the upcoming Prescribing Improvement work taking place throughout the pharmacotherapy teams, we are looking to bring the prescribing of DPP-4 inhibitors into line with the current formulary choice of Sitagliptin. Work will be taking place in the coming months to complete this. As always we appreciate the support of Community Pharmacy teams during this work.

Community Pharmacy Protected Learning Time - CP PLT

Following on from the success of last year's first cycle of CP PLT, we are pleased to announce its return for 2025. We plan to run this much in the same way as last year with pharmacies given the choice of days in which to close for a morning or afternoon to undertake training or activities much in the same way as has been long established for GP surgeries.
