Getting It Right First Time (GIRFT) Review of Tuberculosis (TB) in Scotland

I am writing to draw your attention to the recently published report on the <u>Getting It Right First Time (GIRFT) Review of Tuberculosis</u>, commissioned by the Scottish Government last year.

The report presents a comprehensive, data-driven analysis of TB services across Scotland, highlighting both areas of excellence and variation in service provision. It was developed in collaboration with TB services and Health Protection Teams in each health board to gain a detailed understanding of local service delivery and the challenges faced. The report sets out a series of recommendations aimed at improving the consistency, effectiveness, and equity of TB prevention, diagnosis, and treatment.

These recommendations span both local and national levels and are designed to reinforce Scotland's commitment to the World Health Organisation's 'End TB Strategy'.

As you will be aware, Scotland has historically been a low-incidence TB country. However, the recent increase in TB cases sustained into 2024 and 2025 signals a concerning reversal of progress made towards elimination.

Scotland is no longer on track for TB elimination and action is required to halt the increase in case numbers and widening inequalities. The GIRFT review therefore provides a timely and evidence-based framework to address this emerging challenge, while highlighting priorities for action.

In light of this, I am asking Chief Executives, Directors of Public Health, Medical Directors and clinicians in copy to:

 Review and implement the GIRFT TB recommendations relevant to your service area (individual health board data packs have also been issued).
