

Have you seen the latest Nitazene alert? Our colleagues at Public Health Scotland have asked us to flag to community pharmacy teams their latest alert concerning Nitazenes, synthetic opioids that are now being widely detected across Scotland. These can be hundreds of times stronger than heroin and are contributing to an increase in overdoses and drug deaths. From **Monday the 1st of September 2025**, there will be a third option added to the NEO360 ORT module message function, allowing Pharmacy Teams to communicate with the locality addiction teams. Have you seen the new Clozapine e-learning module? NHS Education for Scotland, in collaboration with Learn It Online and the Scottish Mental Health

Pharmacist Specialist Interest Group, has launched new e-learning modules on clozapine management. These modules cover a range topics such as blood monitoring, side effect management, and service delivery. The modules are designed to meet the needs of the mental health workforce and wider healthcare professional network, and are suitable for staff across the multidisciplinary team including doctors, nurses, pharmacists, pharmacy technicians, and support workers. The following suite of resources are available:

Now Available:

- **Clozapine - A Comprehensive Clinical Programme.** This is a programme which consists of 10 standalone modules covering a wide range of topics, in particular blood monitoring and managing side effects.

Coming Soon:

- **Clozapine - A Concise Clinical Overview.** This is a condensed version of the 10-module clozapine comprehensive programme. The 3 modules cover key topics, in particular blood monitoring and managing side effects. This course will be particularly useful for those working in non-specialist settings, such as primary or acute care.
- **Clozapine-Induced Gastrointestinal Hypomotility.** This module will explore some of the most common and potentially serious clozapine side effects, namely clozapine-induced gastrointestinal hypomotility and constipation.

Have you seen the comms about the new Unscheduled Care PGD? The PGD for Unscheduled Care has been updated. Please see attached V32 of the PGD which has been revised by various stakeholders. Within the 'Whats New v32' you will see the unscheduled care PGD will now be revised every 2 years. Registered Healthcare Professionals are covered under a PGD as soon as they accept the professional obligations when signing, while there is no regulatory or legal requirement for copies of the signed sheets to be submitted to the Board, it is recommended that Boards keep a list of the Registered Healthcare Professionals that are operating under a Patient Group Direction(s). In place of submitting signed sheets to the board, NHS Lanarkshire now has an e-form available for Community Pharmacy Registered Healthcare Professionals to notify boards of PGD sign up: [PGD Sign Up](#) (please note this is a live link and will be available to access ongoing from our [CP webpage](#)) . This does not replace any local processes your employer may have in regard to signing PGDs/keeping signed copies on premises.

Are you aware of the changes to ophthalmic prescribing for Stage 2 treatment prescriptions? In a joint letter (attached), the Chief Pharmaceutical Officer and Chief Optometric Advisor outline that independent prescribing optometrists will now be able to issue Stage 2 treatment prescriptions, which can be dispensed in community pharmacies. This change is expected to result in an increase in such prescriptions being presented for dispensing.


Are you aware of the changes to the asthma guidelines? NES will be hosting a webinar designed to raise awareness of the key changes to asthma management described in the BTS/NICE/SIGN guidelines (2025). Aimed at Pharmacists and Pharmacy Technicians, it will improve confidence in deciding on appropriate treatment, patient education and referral. [Book via NES](#). 10th September.

Are you a prescriber? Please see attached correspondence regarding the launch of Version 2 of the Guideline on [Items which should not be prescribed in NHS Lanarkshire](#) (MOLCV V2) All prescribers (and those who make recommendations about prescribing) are asked to review and support the recommendations in the guideline. Prescribing will continue to be monitored. Further communications will be released across Social Media. Attached is also the July CPIP PF+ newsletter in case you missed it!

Have you submitted your PCR data? Please ensure any NRT records are up to date, PCR data pending from Q4 needs to be submitted by the 27th of August 2026. Please remember PCR data triggers your service fees and counts towards the Scottish Government LDP target. At the end of Q3 24/25 Lanarkshire sat significantly

below the Scottish target and was one of the lowest performing health boards. A survey will be coming out shortly to all pharmacy teams across Lanarkshire to better understand the driving factors behind high & low performance. These findings will feed into the national service specification review currently underway with Scottish Government.

Medicine shortages present ongoing challenges across NHS Scotland, and some have the potential to impact significantly on patient care.
